OBAN SAILING CLUB TOWN REGATTA

Oban sailing club held its annual regatta over the weekend of the 10th/11th June.

A light wind forecast for the weekend did not deter a fleet of nine dinghies and six keelboats from

taking part.

Dinghies raced both days in the mornings with an advanced and novice class and keelboats in the afternoons.

A light easterly breeze filled in and 4 races were completed off the clubhouse for the dinghies.

Andrew Chapman (Feva) and Chris Dowd (laser) were going toe to toe on the results in class A with Ewan Dowd (laser) keeping them honest for a tight three way battle on day one.

Points were all square with Andrew and Chris after day one.

In the novice class Ruari Cottier sailed well to win all four races with Finlay and Liz Cottier keeping it a family affair in second and third.

On Saturday afternoon the keelboats kicked off with a race out the bay to Sgeir Dhonn (the famous seal spotting island), down to Ganavan then a short lap of the bay to the finish.

Eric Chapman's Elixir of Lorn won the start and never looked back with a solid race win. Chris Dowd and team on Kittiewake held off the Forteith's Shadowfax to take second and Shadowfax third.



A quick lunch break then the keelboats went out for race 2. A two lap course round the bay. Shadowfax won the start to take an early lead with the fleet chasing behind. A pile up at the first mark saw Elixir pop out into the lead to sail into a huge margin of victory to win the race and the keelboat class for the weekend. Chris Dowd showed great form to again take a second with Kittewake and Shadowfax recovered from a windless patch to get back to third.

ROUND MULL RACE



In it's 38th year, Oban sailing clubs much anticipated annual Ardfern Yachts and Owen Sails sponsored Round Mull Yacht race took place over the last weekend in June.

The race is run from Friday to Sunday, with three legs totalling 94 nautical miles and taking in overnight stops in Tobermory, Bunessan and racing through the sound of Iona and the Torran rocks. Throw in Staffa and you really have a bucket list race.

28 yachts arrived at the start in Oban split into 4 classes with a handful of yachts also competing for the double handed trophy.

The first start gun was fired at midday and the classes raced off in five minute intervals.

One or two boats were a bit keen to get going with Elixir of Lorn being scored OCS in class two, whilst a couple of class one yachts returned and exonerated themselves.

A fresh white sail fetch took the yachts over to Lismore light and then the angle eased with spinnakers set for a reach up the sound of Mull. But as usual the sound of Mull had other ideas and the race turned into an upwind lottery. With the breeze dying the race team set a finish outside Tobermory. Unfortunately several yachts had to retire unable to make the time limit.

Once the handicaps were applied, the X332 Madog from Helensburgh won the Mishnish Bucket for best overall corrected time with the Chalmers Sigma 400 Sunrise second and Alison Chadwick with team Hot Toddy third on the Moody 336.



Saturday dawned with a big forecast for the back of Mull, so for the first time in years, the race team decided it would not be safe to head to Bunessan with a forecast of over 30 knots.

So the decision was made to race in the sound of Mull, from Tobermory down to Salen and back.



Sunday morning and the breeze was back on for the race to Oban taking Kerrera to Port. Spinnakers were set and the fleet stormed down the sound of Mull, with kites being held all the way to Lismore. A brief fetch followed to Kerrera, then a run up the sound to the finish line off Oban Sailing club.

Once the results were calculated
Autism on the water was declared the winner
with a beaming Murray MacDonald taking the
Glencoe trophy for the best corrected time on the
leg. Maximoose Too was second and the
Forteith's 31.7 Shadowfax finally showed some
form to finish third.

With all three leg times added together Cameron Still and the team on Maximoose Too having sailed consistently all weekend, were declared overall Round Mull race winners, winning the Torran Rock and Class one.

Sunrise took second in class two with the Balmforth's Tangaroa taking third.

Madog won class two, with Shadowfax second and Nick Marshall's J92 Satisfaction third. Class three was won by Hot Toddy, with Jon Fitzgerald's Sigma33 White Lightening second and Alastir Pugh's Contessa 32 Marisca third.

Restricted sail was won by Calisa with nobody else managed to complete all three legs. The Sigma 33 White Lightening won the double handed trophy, an excellent performance given the conditions over the weekend.

Oban sailing club wishes to thanks main sponsors Owen Sails, Ardfern Yacht Centre, Forteith RHPS, T,Barbour Fuel limited and the Oban Seafood hut. Thanks also to the race team and James Hardie and the lovely committee boat Madadh. And a huge thanks to all the club members that made the event a success.

A start was set in Tobermory harbour and the fleet blasted out to a turning mark and rounded for a downwind roller coaster ride to Salen. With the wind gusting at over 30knots some yachts hoisted spinnakers and double digit speeds were recorded.

Once at the Green Isle the yachts set for a beat back to Tobermory with much reduced sail plans. Winner of the day and the Bunessan Hall trophy was Cameron Still's Maxi 1300 Maximoose Too with a strong showing, with the J92 Satisfaction coming in second after a flying downwind ride. Third was Sunrise with some consistent sailing.

The yachts returned to Tobermory harbour with many tall tales and a general consensus that not going to Bunessan was the correct decision.

If you have been paying attention you may have noticed a new installation on the Adventure Oban Shed.




Oban Sailing Club, Adventure Oban and Oban Bay Community Berthing, have joint funded an Automated External Defibrillation (AED) device.

Although Monday Mayhem got off to a late start this season it has been a success so far with participant numbers encouraging, being in the low to mid 20's with both adult and junior members taking part.

However, it has evolved from its original concept, it remains very much a fun on the water evening without formal tuition or instruction, but with a structure that nurtures improvement of knowledge and skill.

So, what's new, well the sailors have been split in to two groups the "Mayhem Lot" and the "Moochers Crew", weird I know but the names stuck. The Mayhem group is for the less experienced sailors where activities are games based and more relaxed and the Moochers group has a focus on the more skilled sailors where activities may include set courses, cruising, and skilled manoeuvring.

Not only that but we also have the Drascombe when crews are available to take out people who have had no on the water experience at all, it sails amongst the fleet so that people can get a taste for sailing.

As some may know the Monday mayhem does not happen on the last Monday of each month and is organised by the dinghy racing enthusiasts this allows for the keen and experienced sailors to take part in a little more adventurous sailing either cruising or sailing set courses and possibly informal race and is open to the junior sailors. With the junior sailors in mind a junior committee is to be formed by them under the direction of Ruby Howard so that they can have a voice within OSC, and they are noisy, well sometimes.

Monday just does not happen without our diligent volunteers. It takes nine volunteers' water and shore based of varying skill sets to enable a fully functioning Monday evening seven if we do not have the Drascombe, at 5 we can only allow one combined group, at 3 only 6 boats can take to the water, less than that its cancellation. At present we have five people who are taking most of the strain and the holidays are coming up so anyone who feels they could help in any way please get in touch.
